#### Welcome Back

Welcome back to our new term. The children all worked so hard last term so I hope you all had a good Christmas and they had a well-earned break. It was lovely to see the children enjoying their end of term party day and completing Christmas activities. The children looked great in their Christmas outfits and jumpers! We were so impressed by how hard all the children worked for the Christmas performances and the team work shown. We would like to say a huge thank you for last term and all the support we received, including the kind words and gifts for staff.

#### **School Rebuilding Programme**

We start the year with the exciting news that we are one of 7 schools in County Durham to be chosen for the School Rebuilding Programme this year. This means that we will get a rebuild or full refurbishment and look forward to finding out more about this, including when this will be starting. So far, we have had guidance on the 'School Rebuilding Programme' which explains that the ten-year programme was announced in June 2020.

In 2022 the Department for Education selected 300 schools for the programme, with the aim being they are completed at a rate of 50 per year over the next 5 years. The Department for Education, who completed the site survey prior to choosing our school, say the aim is that the programme will ensure we have a 'modern educational environment' and we very much look forward to the programme starting.

When we have more information regarding start dates and how the work will be carried out, we will let you know. In the short term we have been provided with a general guide to schools as part of the School Build Programme which outlines the overall aims of the programme and lets us know what the roles of the project team will be.

# Show Racism the Red Card

As part of our work in school on equality and inclusion, we will be working with the 'Show Racism the Red Card' team in February. Year 3/4 and Year 5/6 will each have a workshop to develop a greater understanding of tackling racism in society. We already focus on equality and inclusion through our PSHE curriculum but these sessions will deepen children's understanding. We look forward to welcoming the team for their session on 13<sup>th</sup> February.

## Chinese New Year Celebrations

As part of work on Chinese New Year, we will be looking at the traditions and cultures so children can learn about the 'Year of the Rabbit'. We look forward to welcoming Lip Lee, a member of the Chinese community, in school presenting an assembly and demonstrating his fantastic origami skills. He is due in school on Friday 27<sup>th</sup> January.

# School Closure Procedures

In cases of extremely bad weather this winter we may have to consider school closure. We always avoid this option but at times it is required.
